ANNEXURE-II

Schedule-II

Management of Municipal Solid Waste

1. Collection of Municipal Solid Wastes:

Municipal Solid Waste management is being handled by two state Government Departments, i.e. Urban Development and Poverty Alleviation Department (UD&PA Deptt.) and Trade and Commerce Department.

The Aizawl Municipal Council was formed in 16th November 2010 and Sanitation cell of the UD&PA Deptt. is now attached to the Council to look after wastes management.

There are 63 (sixtythree) localities in the City. The Sanitation cell of the UD&PA Deptt. collects directly from 3 (three) localities in the extreme northern part of the city, while wastes from the remaining 60 (sixty) localities are collected through local agencies, i.e. the Local Council. The Local Council are financed by the UD&PA Deptt. and wastes are collected by trucks and trippers with bells on regular basis.

Trade and Commerce Department separately collect wastes from market places by placing several RCC Bins in 5 (five) markets in the city.

As regard to bio-medical wastes, large quantities are treated as per the bio-medical waste rules. Although the Hospitals and Health Care authorities are aware of necessary conditions to be applied, a large quantity of them are still simply mixed with the municipal solid waste. However, simprovement is seen recently due to awareness programmes and interactions with the Health Care Facilities.

2. Segregation of Municipal Solid Wastes:

Wastes are not segregated at any point.

3. Storage of Municipal Solid Wastes:

Under the UD & PA Department, no storage facilities for municipal solid waste are established. Wastes collected are directly transported to the place of disposal.

There are five bins placed at different stations/markets within Aizawl City placed by the Trade & Commerce Department for collection of market wastes.

Transportation of Municipal Solid Wastes:

Waste are transported by means of truck vehicle, which are not specially designed. At present 68 trucks are available under UD&PA Department.

The Trade & Commerce Department outsources the collection and transportation of wastes to selected contractors.

5. Processing of Municipal Solid Wastes:

Scientific technologies are not yet adopted for processing wastes and so wastes are neither processed nor recycled at present. However, attempts have been taken to adopt scientific technologies for processing of waste utilising technologies like composting, vermiculture etc.

6. Disposal of Municipal Solid Wastes:

Landfilling System is not yet adopted. The present system of disposal of solid waste is "open dumping" at the dumping ground prepared by UD&PA Department.

The State Investment Programme Implementation and Monitoring Unit (SIPMIU) of the UD&PA Deptt. identified landfilling site at Tuirial just besides the present Dumping area.

Specifications for Landfill Sites

There is no landfill site at present. However, SIPMIU is identififying the present dumping site as the landfill side for the future for which necessary actions are being taken.
